The evening then brought all 300 performers back on stage for the final songs: *Rockin' All Over the World*, a very emotional *Winds Of Change* (the audience used their lights from their phones; this was a magical moment), *Sweet Child Of Mine* and *The Final Countdown*.

Mrs Horan, Principal of Hagley Catholic High School, then thanked everybody involved and congratulated all the young people on their amazing show.

The audience went crazy as two 18ft inflatable Flying V Guitars suddenly appeared and rocked out in the final song, *Livin' On A Prayer*. The atmosphere was electric as fire jets; smoke and streamers filled the stage.

Suddenly a roar of motorbike engines filled the Town Hall, as Michael McCarron appeared on a motorbike dressed as Meatloaf for a spinetingling version of *Bat Out Of Hell*. This gave the chance for our young performers to let off steam, wave to the crowd and feel like superstars as they left the stage. The band completed the song to rapturous applause and cheers from the audience.

Hagley Catholic High School Retreat & Pilgrimage

Our Key Stage 3 pupils enjoy an annual retreat at The Briars, the residential Catholic Youth Retreat Centre in Nottingham. Our pupils spent a weekend reflecting on the themes of friendship and community. They explored their relationships with themselves, with each other, with the wider world and with God. Through a varied programme of practical activities, including team building, countryside hiking and competitive games, pupils were guided through a number of biblical and spiritual reflections, encouraging them to respond to Jesus' invitation to discipleship. Pupils had a great weekend and returned to school, ready to share what they had thought about over the weekend with their peers.

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In February, ninety-six of our Key Stage 4 pupils undertook a pil-

grimage to Krakow, Poland. The four-day journey enabled pupils to reflect on the events of the Holocaust from Christian, Jewish and secular perspectives. Pupils visited the sites of Auschwitz I & II, to see the permanent exhibitions which document the atrocities that were committed against those deemed not to 'fit in' to society by the Third Reich. Our pupils were humbled to meet an elderly Auschwitz survivor; through a translator, they heard some of her vague recollections of what she could remember about life in the camp, but mostly about her life since liberation and how she has come to learn the full horror of her imprisonment as she grew older. Additional activities included a historical tour of the city of Krakow, a trip to Oskar Schindler's Factory Museum, an afternoon in the Jewish Quarter, a trip to a synagogue and time in the city centre. Fr Des celebrated Mass with our pupils immediately before their departure.

In the Summer Term a group of staff went on retreat to Belfast. Over the weekend, staff reflected on the troubles in recent Northern Irish history and saw the segregation that remains in place to this day: a wall taller and longer than the Berlin Wall separates Catholic from Protestant communities in our very own country, yet never features in our headlines! Attending Mass at the Cathedral Presbytery St Peter's, we prayed that the then upcoming Papal Visit to Ireland would help stabilise the situation and enable the Irish and Northern Irish to pave a way into the future in peace. The Mass was broadcast on Irish national radio.

Sixth Form Catholic Life

Spiritual development remains a high priority in Key Stage 5. Many new initiatives have been launched as a direct result of a proactive student body which recognises the importance of faith and wants to nourish it whilst undertaking A-level studies. The 'B-Attitude' Group is a group of our Sixth Formers who have joined the St Vincent DePaul Society, the Catholic Church's domestic charity for poverty. The B-Attituders meet every fortnight to nurture their prayer life and undertake outreach work. As part of their work, they are co-ordinating a 'Gift Box' scheme, whereby they will collect items donated from across the school community, package them up and distribute them to the homeless just before Christmas. Later this year, the Sixth Form will undertake a residential retreat in Soli, the Catholic Youth Retreat Centre for older pupils in Birmingham. The students have recently started the process of organising their own pilgrimage to Portugal, where they will visit Lisbon and Fatima.

St Nicholas Owen Primary Mathematics Journey

In St Nicholas Owen Catholic Multi Academy Company, the primary leads are working hard to ensure that we develop a new culture of deep understanding, competence and confidence in Mathematics.

We are developing our curriculum by using White Rose Maths to include fluency, reasoning and problem solving,

using concrete and pictorial resources and developing those into abstract strategies.

We recognise that pupils need to learn basic number facts and be fluent in Mathematical procedures, alongside developing conceptual understanding, to enable them to solve increasingly complex problems in life and later in the workplace.

Teach Meet St Ambrose 13 September 2018

Our second, St Nicholas Owen, *Teach Meet* event focussed on the theme 'Communication is the Key'. On arrival our guests had the opportunity to sample food from different countries around the globe to celebrate the diverse world in which we communicate. Our guest speakers, Jacqui Woodcock and Liz Spencer, opened the evening by highlighting the impact that poor listening skills have on children's lives and delivered some practical ideas about how we, as professionals, can ensure these listening skills are developed. The key to this is to reinforce the four rules of good listening: listening to all the words; looking at the person who is talking; staying quiet and sitting still.

During the course of the evening, *App That* presenter John Holder, encouraged staff to bring a children's story to life through the use of green screen. This provided a different



stance about how ICT can be used to portray ideas. We also learnt about the importance of levelling Key Stage Two home reader books from Oxford University Press and how this is crucial to the development of language. Plenty of prizes were won over the course of the evening as guests enjoyed the different games that were played such as 'Human Bingo' and 'Catchphrase' which certainly brought out the competiveness in a few members of the audience.

The evening drew to a close with our Art of Sign Language presenter who had everyone entertained by teaching us how to sign the song "Firework" by Katie Perry. Thank you to everyone who supported our event and enthusiastically joined in our activities and very special thanks to Miss Brewer and Miss Holtom for organising and hosting the event: A warm smile is the universal language of kindness.
